

NewsCatcher INTRO TO NEWSPAPERS

This NewsCatcher mimics an old-time paper toy.

Folding the NewsCatcher

- Neatly cut or tear along the bold lines.
- Fold along all horizontal lines. Unfold.
- Fold along all diagonal lines. Unfold.
- Flatten the sheet
- Fold each outside corner under on the diagonal line, forming a smaller square.
- Fold outside corners towards the inside center.
- Pull new outside corners up toward center, allowing lower flaps to open as finger holes.

The outside squares name the functions of a newspaper. The eight 3-part triangle segments inside describe features found in a newspaper.


Step 1. Holding the NewsCatcher in one hand with your thumb and fingers, open and close it as you spell your name.

Step 2. Pick a category. Read the description and use the newspaper to answer the question inside.

Step 3. Use the answer to count as you open and close the news catcher. Continue with Steps 2 and 3 to explore the sections and features in the newspaper.
